Residence Life Updates— Matthew Guy, Manager, Residence Life

In Residence Life we are still working on finding permanent rooms for the last few students who were assigned to temporary spaces in residence. We peaked at over 80 students in temporary spaces and it has been challenging finding a place for everyone. We have really appreciated the cooperation of students and parents during such a busy period.

We are now making plans for Winter Break including residence and activities for the small number of students who stay on campus during this time. We work in partnership with the Wong International Centre to ensure that students staying over the break have an enjoyable festive season. For students leaving for winter break, a reminder that residences close on December 18th at noon and

reopen for returning residents on January 8th. We will be asking residents to help with an energy reduction program over the break – switching off and unplugging appliances before leaving campus. Over the last two years this has saved a significant amount of energy and, of course, greenhouse gases.

As we look forward to the new semester, the staff in Residence Life will be starting to plan for the 2012 academic year, sending out information about Residence Assistant (RA) recruitment for the next year, planning room selection for returning students and encouraging new students for 2012 to pay their deposits and apply for residence early. We will also be opening our Cutten House residence following a program of bathroom refurbishment. By fall of 2012, Cutten House will add over 200

rooms to our inventory which will certainly be a welcome addition after the increase in students requesting on -campus accommodations over the past two years.

Today I received an email from our RA team in Crowell Tower. They celebrated their 100th program in that residence – in just under two months! With events ranging from Apple Picking to movies, home cooked meals and a visit to the corn maze, the RAs try to provide a range of activities to entertain, engage and educate residents. These activities are planned in all residences. Please encourage your sons and daughters to take full advantage of the activities available in residence - and talk to their RAs if they have any good ideas
